What Is Research?

- Research is a study that is done to answer a question.
- Scientists do research to learn about what works best to help patients.
- Research is not the same as treatment.

Why Is Research Important?

Research has led to discoveries that make our lives better, such as:

- New tests to diagnose conditions more accurately
- New drugs to treat cancer, diabetes, and other diseases
- New medical technologies such as ultrasound
- Improved medical procedures

Points to Consider

- Taking part in research is voluntary.
- A research study may or may not help you personally.
- In the future, the results could help others who have a health condition.

Study Overview

Pregnant volunteers needed

We are seeking participants that are pregnant who are having routine care or are planning to undergo invasive testing (CVS or Amniocentesis) to take part in a study.

You will undergo a simple blood draw that will be used to further research and develop tests related to pregnancy and fetal conditions.

Participant Details

You may be eligible for this research study if you are:

- Pregnant
- *Meet the local age requirements for inclusion in the study*
- Willing to have blood drawn

What is required:

- Informed consent
- Giving blood via a standard blood draw
- Access to yours and your newborns medical records
